#### Jeremy writes...

Well, we've made it to June. As I'm writing this in late May anything I write regarding the current situation could be wildly out of date by the time anyone reads this. Could be a real test of my prophetic skills.

However, I have just received a draught document from the senior leaders in this Diocese setting out how the Church will return to normal. It is a document with key dates missing, of course. These will be determined largely by Government policy, which will itself be determined by medical advice (at least in theory). Whatever advice the Government receives will itself be weighted by what happens over coming weeks, and that will be determined largely by the likes of you and me; how we behave and act, and what we do to reduce or increase risk. The onus is on us.

Our experience of lockdown will, of course, vary from person to person. Some will have experienced a relatively small change to their lives, whilst for others it may have been cataclysmic. I have been repeatedly glad of where I live. When I have been able to get out I find myself surrounded by miles of beautiful coast and countryside, in stark contrast to, say, a family penned up in a block of flats surrounded by more blocks of flats. It's not surprising people want to escape here when given a chance. Maybe though we should question the equity of who gets to escape here and who cannot.

One thing I have been aware of, both in myself, in others I meet, and especially in reading social media posts, is the gradual and continued rise in background anxiety. It's led people to say foolish things they wouldn't usually say, and express petty prejudices others wouldn't normally see. Ironically, it has led us to be more honest. But, honesty can be painful, particularly when we find we do not like what we see, and we recognise we are looking in a mirror. No one is perfect. We could all be better human beings. I find praying helps. In part, this is because praying forces me to reflect on my own attitudes and behaviour; to confess; to change; to grow. There are good resources, tailored for a time like this, to help us deal with that disarming view we might get in the mirror. Here are two I think are particularly good:

<u>supporting-good-mental-health</u> - this is a Church of England resource and is ideal for those looking for a spiritual approach to mental wellbeing.

https://www.smilingmind.com.au - this uses a secular approach (mindfulness), and again, I have found it personally helpful.

Oh, and how will the Church be reopening? The answer is slowly, using small steps. I doubt we will be back to normal this year, and even when we are it will be a new normal and not the old one.

#### Fine Foundation Centre

Beer Village Heritage Reg. Charity No.1087162 It hardly seems possible that another month has gone by and some of us are picking up the threads of our old life styles, albeit cautiously. However, the future continues to be uncertain, and

the concept of staying physically apart from one another puts an obvious restriction on our usual activities. How can it be possible to host a coffee morning or a craft sale? Could barrel-rolling work with only one person per barrel – and no spectators? The Royal Yachting Association has issued some really helpful guidance on sailing, so could that mean that Regatta can go ahead? Will it be possible to hold the Flower Show in August, or will the constraints make it physically, and financially, unviable? The Mariners' Hall had a 40's band booked to entertain us for VE Day. The group has been re-booked for VJ Night. Will the event be possible? Can we re-open the Fine Foundation Centre, or will it be too problematic to ensure the safety of our visitors? So many un-knowns.

Let's have some good news. Nature has a way of carrying on regardless of what is happening to humans. Seeds are germinating and lots of new gardeners are experiencing the excitement of seeing new shoots poking up through the soil. As I haven't left the property for several weeks I don't know if it was a case of "the ash before the oak" or the "oak before the ash" so am denied my usual summer weather forecast! Similarly I haven't seen if the rooks are nesting near the tops of the trees or further down. In the garden the ash trees were in leaf fairly early, and we've been able to transplant a sapling to a permanent home. Henry found a lovely little fossilized bivalve when he was digging out a new vegetable bed - another reminder of the fascinating geology of the area. Once again we've left some of the grassed area as a flower meadow. I came across an interesting report recently which suggested that the low-flowering daisies and dandelions which we have in our lawns supply a huge amount of nourishment for bees. It recommended cutting the grass in April and then not mowing during May in order to maximise the effect. The researchers had been surprised as they had assumed that not mowing at all was best.

I'll reiterate my annual request – please keep cats indoors at night (or at least at dusk and dawn) during June and July. The baby bats are just beginning to come out of the roosts, and their flying skills haven't been honed as yet. As a result they are likely to plummet towards the ground where cats can catch them easily. Bats only have one baby a year, and then not every year, so every baby bat killed hinders the regeneration of the endangered species. The females are able to store sperm after mating in the autumn, and bring it in to action when they feel physically ready sometime later.

Back to the lockdown. Beer Action Group is continuing to do a superb job is keeping people connected through their system of co-ordinators and volunteers as well as their regular newsletters and posts on social media. Thank you to all of the local shops which are offering a fantastic service to everyone in the village. Beer may be a small community, but no one living here needs to feel isolated, be unable to access money, or run out of food. Thank you to everyone who is offering support in whatever way, however small.

Beer Village Heritage is doing something too. The HUB, set up by the Action Group, has some hosted sessions during the week. BVH is available on Fridays at 1400 to talk about anything relating to the natural world, fossils, pottery, village stories and anything else you'd like to talk about. We had pitcher wasp nests last week as one of the "bring and show" exhibits. Kate Ponting and Norah Jaggers are there to answer questions with other experts waiting in the wings.

We plan to have an exhibition in the Fine Foundation Centre on our Covid-19 Experience in due course. It'll follow the same format as the "Blow-ins" and "Memories of the Coronation" with a loose-leaf folder holding your thoughts and memories. It could be a piece of prose or a poem. It could be a song or a picture. It could be a photograph or a diary. 
Throughout this time of Covid lockdown our local lifeboats have continued to operate and have indeed been called out on quite a few occasions.

They depend on our support and our donations but have been unable to pursue their usual fund-raising activities since lock-down began. So what lifeboats do we have near us? In fact we are very well provided for. The RNLI have stations at both Lyme Regis and Exmouth, both with first-class boats as shown opposite.

Our region is also covered by the inshore lifeboat at Sidmouth which is a fully self-funded independent lifeboat. Sidmouth Lifeboat is not part of, or funded by, the RNLI. It is funded entirely by the community in and around the Sid Valley and friends of Sidmouth Lifeboat.



The Atlantic 85 is a RIB (rigid inflatable boat): Length: 8.5m,

Power: two 4-stroke engines of 115hp each,

Max.Speed: 35 knots - one of the fastest in the RNLI fleet.

**Exmouth Lifeboat Station** has a Shannon Class lifeboat.

the "R and J Welburn". The Shannon is the latest class of all-weather lifeboat to join the RNLI fleet and is the first modern all-weather lifeboat to be propelled by waterjets instead of traditional propellers. She is the most agile and manoeuvrable all-weather lifeboat yet.

Waterjet propulsion powered by two 650hp engines

Max. Speed: 25 knots

Range: 250 nm.

Exmouth also has a small inshore lifeboat.

**So what's so interesting about these dates?** Here's a tiny bit of what could be written:-

Whit Sunday, Pentecost, is the seventh Sunday after Easter and commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Christ's disciples.

**Ember Days** are clusters of three days four times a year, roughly around the start of the four seasons. They are set aside by the Church as a way to mark the passage of seasons through prayer and fasting. Possibly occasioned by the agricultural feasts of ancient Rome the name derives from "imbren", the old English for 'round course', or four times a year. Near the time of the Norman Conquest, ordinations were ordered to take place at those four times annually. The Ember Days following Pentecost usually give thanks for early harvesting and we pray for men to be called of God for ordination. "The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest" (Luke 10:2).

According to folklore, the weather conditions of each of the three days of an Embertide foretells the weather conditions for the following three months.

**St Petroc**, c.468-564, is the patron saint of Cornwall,

**St Boniface**, c.675-745, was born in Crediton and is the patron saint of Devon. He was born Winfrid or Wynfrith or Winifred - the name of the Church in Branscombe!

**Trinity Sunday** celebrates the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, the three Persons of God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

**St Barnabas**, patron saint of Cypress: The College of St Barnabas is a Community of retired Anglicans uniting in Faith and Care.

**St Alban**, d.o.b. unknown, died c.250 to 300: the first-recorded British Christian martyr.

John the Baptist, died c. AD 28-36, "the forerunner of Christ".

**St Peter & St Paul**, patron saints of Rome. Two of the twelve Apostles, often celebrated together.

**St Thomas**, one of the twelve Apostles, commonly known as "Doubting Thomas".

Note: In secular terms, doesn't this remind you of the present shortage of harvest labour on our farms?!

#### **Beer Parish Council Message**

We are all aware that some lockdown measures are being lifted in Phase 2 of the Coronavirus pandemic, and some schools and businesses will reopen from 1 June. The Parish Council understands that our villagers will feel different emotions about this; some maybe relieved that they can go back to work, open their business or travel longer distances to visit friends and family, however others will feel anxious and scared by this.

We will all have to deal with these changes and the Parish Council met recently by a remote video conference to discuss how we can handle this. It's important that we have a plan and communicate this especially as Phase 3, which may happen from 1 July, is when restrictions on staying overnight and holidays may lift and the village will be open to welcome tourists.

We are all too aware that many families have been visiting Beer for years and see it as their second home. We hear stories of adults who came here on holiday with their parents 30 years ago and are still visiting years later bringing their children. We hear stories of people visiting with three generations and know that many people have owned their caravans for years and come to stay for the whole season.

When people are allowed to stay overnight and come on holiday we need to be ready to welcome them and find a balance, keeping our villagers and visitors safe. We do not want visitors to feel unwelcome as our village does rely on tourism. Our local shops and restaurants which have worked so hard during the pandemic to keep serving us, need their custom to keep open for the rest of the year and especially through the winter. We want to reassure you however that we will not be actively promoting the village whilst the pandemic is still at a critical stage, rather manage the situation, as we know visitors will come when Phase 3 is initiated.


Social distancing is our main priority as lockdown eases. We are discussing various measures such as providing a wider pavement on a part of Fore Street to allow people to feel safe

walking down to the beach and providing additional tables and chairs on the Jubilee to allow the cafes to open for mainly takeaways should they wish. There's also an idea to allow *Squirrel*, the new Seaton delivery service which so many Beer people have utilised, to open a pop-up greengrocers on Charlie's Yard occasionally. None of these ideas have been agreed, however if any of you have other ways or ideas in which we can support the safe re-opening of the village to look after locals' interests, and support visitors, do get in touch by emailing Clerk.beerparishcouncil@googlemail.com

We can then continue to explore these as a Council and report on our progress via our PC Facebook page and website.

We've all got to learn to live and work with social distancing. We know that we're lucky to live and work in a beautiful village, and we're proud of how we've all reacted to the lockdown. We must now let common sense and kindness dictate our modes of behaviour and get back to some sort of 'new' normal. Now is the time to be positive and work out what the 'new' future will look like and how it will work


