Jeremy writes...

I never thought I would become institutionalised, but I have been. Of course, there are those who believe all clergy belong in an institution, and they may have a point. Certainly, there were some strange characters with me at theological college; a bankrupt, the manager of a sausage factory, a general, a (former) terrorist, a diplomat (read spy), and a couple who owned a sizeable part of Leicestershire; and that was just the "normal" ones. What I mean is; during

lockdown things have become simple and certain. There have been clear rules and clear punishments for transgressing them (unless you're part of the government team of course). What I was allowed to do and what was expected of me was unambiguous - just as in an institution. And now that's in the past.

In July we take a great leap into maybe not the unknown - because we all remember a world before - but the uncertain. And that can make us feel uneasy. The world of July, with open shops and pubs, will have many echoes of normality, but it will only be an echo. There will be constant reminders that this is not as it once was; that a threat lingers; and, that we will only slowly emerge into a new normal. The past is truly that, and it will never return. In time we hope the economy will recover, replenishing our capacity to support families and communities, and also to bolster our resilience to further challenges that might arise. We were told during the worst of the past three months that we were all in it together. I am not sure that was ever quite true, but I hope we will be willing to build a future where risk and reward is more equitable.

In June we began to reopen our church buildings so that people could come and sit, reflect and pray. In July we will begin simple services. From Sunday 5th July there will be a weekly service in St Michael's, Beer, at 9.30am. For the time being we are not

allowed to have a communion service, nor to sing. So, the service we offer will be necessarily shorter and simpler, which may suit some, and we will not be able to offer coffee afterwards. Actually, we shall be offering a service of a similar format to the one we have been sharing online through the Church website and Facebook page, and we shall continue to produce and share the online service. We're also going to try something new: It has become clear that there are those in the community who would like to be able to access a Church service, but either cannot attend in person or lack the technical ability to make use of internet offerings. I'm looking at using a teleconferencing facility to allow people at home to access one of our services being held in our church buildings. Once I have a number for them to ring into all they will need do is call, using any telephone and at the appropriate time, and they will be able to hear the service happening live in a church building, and join in should they wish. We will have orders of service available to distribute to those we know about who would wish to participate in this way. So, if that's you, please let myself or Gayle know.

We have tried informally, to keep some of our interests such as Book Club and Writers group ticking over and are looking at how these smaller groups can get going again within the changing guidance.

It obviously wasn't the same but I am sure we will make up for it when conditions allow.

Fine Foundation Centre

Beer Village Heritage Reg. Charity No.1087162 Another month into 2020 and we now know the answers to some of the questions posed last month. Most of the village events planned

for this summer have been cancelled or postponed. However, we're delighted to see that the shops are beginning to re-open, having recently been given the go-ahead by the government. Welcome back! The Parish Council has a number of plans to help to revitalise the village by making use of the public realm areas. With the hospitality industry being allowed to re-start in early July, we expect, and hope, that our visitors will return.

Beer Village Heritage is discussing the issues which are involved in re-opening the Fine Foundation Centre. As both the centre and the Bomb Shelter are unattended there are obvious problems with cleaning regimes, not to mention monitoring distancing. Both venues would need to change their displays and remove all the hands-on material. Hopefully a compromise can be found. The Trustees will also consider whether it will be possible to offer some rock-pool safaris during the summer. Again, this would involve limiting numbers and would depend on our volunteers being prepared to lead the sessions.

Our on-line sessions through the HUB, hosted by BAG, have been fun, although not particularly well attended. We've sown some seeds in jam jars which has enabled us to see the root system develop. Fossils and stones from the beach have been popular, and we talked about the story of the skimming stones. Subjects as varied as identifying leaves to pirates and pottery have kept us amused. We moved the time to 1100 on Thursdays – do join us.

Once again, please keep cats indoors at night (or at least at dusk and dawn) during July. The baby bats are just beginning to come out of the roosts, and their flying skills haven't been honed as yet. As a result they are likely to plummet towards the ground where cats can catch them easily.

The tawny owls are very vocal at the moment. Henry had an interesting encounter with one during day's light last week. An adult owl stayed sitting on the fence while Henry collected the camera and took a series of photographs, with the bird appearing to be interested in what he was doing. We're seeing lots of swifts and swallows swooping over the garden, particularly during the evening. They, like the bats, enjoy the midges and moths!

Talking of moths, the mullein moth caterpillars are chewing their way through the woolly silvery leaves of the mullein plants. If desperate they are able to survive on figwort leaves, so we've left some of those plants in the garden too. Just a little helping hand to ensure the survival of the species.

It'll soon be time to be on the look-out for glow worms. Unfortunately they don't light up until about 2300, so keeping a daily record can be a bit tiresome. The juveniles can be really annoying as they will "light up" for a few seconds and then switch off for a minute or so. It means that you can catch a glimpse of one which then disappears before you can check that you really did see a little glow.

Just a reminder that we plan to have an exhibition in the Fine Foundation Centre on our Covid-19 Experience in due course. It'll follow the same format as the "Blow-ins" and "Memories of the Coronation" with a loose-leaf folder holding your thoughts and memories. It could be a piece of prose or a poem. The Mullein Moth

The Mullein Moth, *Cucullia verbasci*, is a large brownish coloured moth with a wingspan of up to 5 cm and a heavy body. They are not uncommon although it is the larval stage (caterpillar) that you are more likely to notice. They are large and have very striking yellow black and

white markings. The caterpillars feed on mullein - verbascum - and don't mind if it's a wild plant growing as a weed or one of the cultivated varieties you might be nurturing in your garden. Here's a photo of a Mullein moth caterpillar on a wild Mullein plant in our garden, taken just last





month (June 10th). The larvae will also thrive on figwort and buddleia if there are no verbascums about. Left undisturbed, a few of these caterpillars will demolish a large verbascum plant in just a day or two. A larger infestation on a buddleia can strip it bare.

Allotments Update 28th June 2020

Potential famine on the allotments look likely to have been avoided for the time being, as more unsettled weather developed through June. Around 24 hours of rain over 18th/19th produced 52mm (just over 2 ins) in the East Beer weather station's rain gauge, with a further topping up towards the end of the month as low pressure became established across the UK. Luckily, the flood barrier (four sandbags) across the top gate of the allotments opposite Greg L held up, and although he tells me it was touch and go, the evacuation plan for his leeks and purple sprouting plants didn't need to be activated. However, along with the rain, we still saw a spell of warm, sunny days, with the mercury reaching the dizzy heights of 25.6 C on 24th, the hottest day so far this year, and with 30 C widely seen further inland.

Now just past the longest day, and already the odd muttering heard from doomsters and gloomsters about nights starting to pull in and chain saws needing a service prior to commencement of winter logging. However, lots of good growing and harvesting still to come, currently some nice summer cabbages being cut, peas being harvested, and early young carrots now ready. First tomatoes and cucumbers being picked back in the greenhouse, but outdoor ones will be a while yet. The later planted potatoes now looking really good after recent rains and should produce a good crop, unlike those put in in early March which are now dying off due to lack of meaningful rain through April and May. Runner and climbing French beans now looking bonny, lots now reaching the top of the supports, and starting to set. Courgettes also now being cut, and doubtless the odd marrow-sized one will soon appear on those plants not regularly checked. Pumpkins also now setting, the two plants on the communal weed heap are sending out some long vines, we may let these grow down over the cliff, hopefully the fruits can then be used by Kim as a navigation aid when homeward bound.

Some of the more unusual vegetables spotted on plots this year include rainbow beetroot and carrot (probably as a thanks to NHS and Care workers), seakale (now devoured by the pigeon population), yellow & black courgettes, and butternut squash. Nice to see a bit of variety appearing, and we're always looking for something new to try. However, although a warming climate will broaden the range of potential crops, Clinton Estates are unlikely to look favourably on recent suggestions for a date palm grove, mango orchard, and sugar cane plantation, and anyway, we'll all be in serious trouble if these can thrive in East Devon.

Keep digging, and most of all, enjoy your gardenin'

But we have managed it, although a little tricky to start with and still occasionally budged by technology issues, we are now holding weekly meetings for both the Cub and Scouts sections.

The number of children involved with these sessions is obviously lower that we expect at the Scout Hut, as sitting in front of a computer or table is not everyone's idea of a fun Scout Night but those that are able to join in are enjoying it and numbers are increasing steadily. So far we have managed stay at home camps, treasure hunts,

art lessons, cookery lessons (run by the children themselves on some occasions) and some traditional Scout Badge work that can be completed at home.

Moving on, we are experimenting with linking to other Scout Groups in the UK and abroad for live streaming events, we'll let you know how this goes.

A lot of work goes on behind the scenes of a Scout Group, as with most organisations, that many people are less aware of. We still need to maintain our building in the village and run a compliant committee system to administer the group.

All of our leaders and committee members are volunteers, some with children in the group and some who are just interested in what we do. Evervone's lives have been affected in different ways due to the sudden changes that COVID-19 and lockdown have caused, and as such. this has affected their ability to support 1st Beer Scout Group in the usual way.

We need to ensure the group is in a strong position to restart face to face meetings as soon as we are given the all clear by Scout Head Quarters and to do this we need to make some alterations to our committee. Our Group Treasurer, who has helped us magnificently for the last few years is due to step down this year at our AGM (which may now have to be done virtually, as our committee meetings are at the moment) so we are looking for someone to take on this role.

Our Group Secretary now has to spend far more time looking after family matters and is looking for someone to share the role with her and finally our Group Chair, who has served the group well for over 5 years now feels that now is a good time for the Scout Group to receive an input of fresh ideas to help it move forwards as we come out of lockdown.

A working knowledge of Scout Groups is not required as there is plenty of help available to anyone considering helping within a Scout Group, enthusiasm to support a village organisation is all that is required.

Beer Parish Council Message

Following on from our last communication we wanted to update you on Phase 2 of the Coronavirus pandemic. Since we last wrote some schools and businesses have reopened and more will do so from the 15th June. People are now allowed to meet with up to six people from different households outside, whilst still continuing to observe the 2 metre social distancing rule. Whilst people can now visit their second homes, these must be day trips and no overnight stays are allowed. People are also not allowed to travel on holiday and stay overnight so our hotel, B&B's, caravan park and holiday cottages remain closed at present.

The Parish Council met remotely on the 4th June and regular monthly meetings will now resume by Zoom. The Coastal Community Team meetings are suspended at present as we are not promoting the village or running any events.

At our meeting we discussed our plans for when the village re-opens to visitors and tourists, which could be from 4th July. When people are allowed to stay overnight and come on holiday we need to be ready to welcome them and find a balance, keeping our villagers and visitors safe.

Social distancing remains our main priority as lockdown eases. The Parish Council have agreed to provide a wider pavement on a part of Fore Street to allow people to feel safe walking down to the beach. We hope that a one-way system for cars from The Dolphin Hotel down to The Anchor will help this and are in discussion with Devon County Council as to how these changes can be introduced. We have also agreed to provide our gazebos and additional tables and chairs on the Jubilee and Charlie's Yard to allow our local businesses to make use of them. Conversations are continuing with them about how we can support them to open safely. We are also in dialogue with Squirrel, the new Seaton delivery service which so many Beer people have utilised, to open a pop-up greengrocers on Charlie's Yard occasionally.

One idea that came from you was to enable social distancing on Sea Hill and access to the beach. We are investigating with Devon County Council whether we can divide Sea Hill by a painted white line so that pedestrians can walk down on the right side (by the brook) and up on the right side (utilising the Sea Hill rope if needed) to enable a 2 metre distance. The road will of course stay open for vehicle access for the fishermen, café deliveries, etc. The footpath

that goes down to the beach from the Jubilee could also become one way down to the beach as it is narrow and this will allow people to social distance. New signage will obviously be placed to help people understand and follow the new instructions.

We're very much hoping that you all embrace and accept these changes as they are steps to protect locals and visitors, and creating the 'new' normal Beer Village. We continue to welcome your feedback and any other ideas you have which will help keep Beer safe. Please share these by emailing -

UPDATE

COVID-19 restrictions are being eased in England from 4th July when many non-essential shops and businesses will be allowed to open provided they meet strict COVID security measures. Even when your thoughts are burdening you with all kinds of terrors about the future. Don't go there. You can't fix the future; you can control the here and now. Be here instead. It's peaceful here.


