BUT STAY SAFE - COVID IS STILL WITH US!

Jeremy writes... (for the last time?)

This is my one-hundred-and-sixty-sixth, and final, "Jeremy writes". I thought of finishing with a summary of the best bits from those articles but find I have already exceeded that word count. Instead, I would like to finish with a thank-you.

Being a Vicar is the strangest role I have ever inhabited. You are both an honorary local and someone held slightly at arms-length. You have the privilege of getting to know many wonderful people, but forming deep friendships is not without its



difficulties. You invest in understanding and growing to love a community but are aware you must finally withdraw from it.

However, there are good reasons clergy should not remain for ever. A previous Parish of mine had a succession of four clergy who together spanned well over a hundred years of ministry. They were four successive generations of the same family and all shared the same first name. Not confusing at all, and evidently not healthy for the life of that Church. Any Parish and any Church community need fresh leadership and direction once in a while. It's healthy. It is also a reminder that the local Church is just that: local, and made up of the faithful people who have come and gone over the years. Clergy merely arrive to contribute their thing, and then should go. In its early days, Ministers of the Methodist Church would spend just one month with each congregation, contributing their particular gift to the life of the local Church before moving elsewhere to repeat the process. It reminded folk that the life of the church locally was firstly their responsibility; it kept power locally rather than being imposed by the Minister; and, it stopped the Ministers from putting themselves first and at the centre of all things – they were simply a resource to strengthen and build up. There are good reasons why

clergy should move on and even better reasons why they should never retire and not continue to serve in parishes they have been with before.

So, I'm moving on to pastures new. That will be good for me, and also for you. It will allow things to emerge which I had neither the talent nor the vision to enable, and it will allow me to take my particular talents and vision to somewhere else that has need of them. I hope to stay considerably longer than a month though!

Services, ministry, Church will continue through a period of vacancy, and in time a new Vicar will be appointed. Please hold those who will manage this process locally in your prayers. And, if the life and health of the local Church is of concern to you, please consider how you can support it.

Beer WI continues to be active, involving members in a variety of online activities and Zoom meetings.



## Beer Parish Council Newsletter

An online Remote Council Meeting was held on the 12<sup>th</sup> January 2021

- There was no Police Report submitted.
- The County Councillor, Martin Shaw, submitted his report to the Council. It was noted that new grants have been made to The Gateway, Beer Men's Shed and Branscombe Parish Council.
- Councillors received reports from the Environment and Community Portfolio, the Assets and Property Portfolio and an update regarding the EDDC Asset Transfer. The Council has received 223 responses from the public both hard copies and online responses, this was felt to be very pleasing.
- An update on the S106 play and sports funding:- The children at the Primary School will be given the opportunity to give their preferences as to how they wish the money to be spent.
- The bank reconciliation was approved to the end of December 2020.
- The amendments to the principles of commercial letting for the Mariners Hall and to approve the redraft of the Delegation of Authority document were approved.
- The new events co-ordinator, Kayleigh Westlake, submitted her report to the council.
  - Kayleigh has lived in Beer all her life and became a part of Beer Parish Council in August 2020 and then in September she became part of the CCT as Beer Parish Council's Events Co-ordinator. Her job is to promote the village and in time

advertise that "Beer is open for Business" and to organise other events in the calendar.

# A New Local Plan for East Devon – Issues and Options Report Consultation

We are advised that East Devon are producing a new local plan for East Devon. To commence the process they have produced an Issues and Options consultation report. This report highlights some of the major planning issues and challenges that we see for East Devon over the years ahead and some of the potential responses. We would welcome your views on the matters we raise or any additional considerations.

It is envisaged that a new local plan will guide future development and contain the full range of planning policies needed for Beer Parish Council to undertake its development management functions and determine planning applications.

As so for many charities, due to the on-going Covid-19 restrictions the start of 2021 has put our Seaton Beer and District Branch fundraising on pause once again. Our Shop at Jubilee Gardens, Beer is closed until we receive advice that we can re-open again. We will be advertising for additional Volunteers during the coming months and for new Shop Managers. The Shop Manager position can be shared and includes ordering stock, rotas, health and safety and other duties. Our Shop is very important and as well as raising funds for the RNLI we give information to people in our area and tourist information, sea safety plus information about the RNLI. We hope that the Covid-19 restrictions will have eased by the summer and we will be able to have our Beer Lifeboat Weekend in July with our Street Collection and Table Top Sale on Saturday 3rd July and 15th Annual Duck Race Day on Sunday 4th July.

During 2020 the Crew and Atlantic 85 Class Lifeboat "Spirit of Loch Fyne "at Lyme Regis Lifeboat Station had a busy year and went out on service 46 times. (thirty times in 2019) The Exmouth lifeboats D Class "George Bearman 2 and Shannon Class lifeboat "R and J Welburn" were also busy. Both lifeboats had a wide variety of call outs to people including swimmers, people on inflatables, walkers cut off by tides, kayakers, power boats and fishing vessels. They are part of 238 lifeboat stations and 240 lifeguard units around the coast of Great Britain.

We send our best wishes to everyone and look forward to being out and about again as soon as possible.

### **Fine Foundation Centre**

Beer Village Heritage Reg. Charity No.1087162 Those of you who have ventured onto the beach will have noticed that the Fine Foundation Centre has a new look. Chris Bright is busy replacing timber which has succumbed to the effect of the

salty atmosphere, and the larch lap will give the building a new lease of life. Once the building renovations have been completed, the Trustees plan to update some of the exhibits in the hope that they will be able to open the centre to the public in the Spring. A recent discussion with those who manage other centres along the coast indicated that most are planning to open in time for the Easter holidays but expect that they may have to delay until some time after then. One of the constraints on working in our centre is social distancing. The centres which rely on volunteers indicated that the time scale for vaccinations will be a factor in when they are able to open. Covid-19 continues to affect our lives in a variety of ways.

We took the decision to organise the Beach Clean on New Year's Day as this has become something of a tradition. We set up a system to ensure social distancing. Each person took one of our rock-pooling buckets which they returned once it was full. We then emptied it into a black sack thereby limiting contact with one another. Over 30 people came to help, and it was good to see a number of youngsters. Apart from the usual pieces of plastic, odd sandals and fishing line, the haul included a BBQ, a pair of insoles, a nail brush and... a bottle of urine.

The webcam in Beer Quarry Caves has been turned off for the time being. It was trained on one of the usual roosting wires for the Greater Horseshoe bats, but none have taken up residence. So, the assumption is that they must be reacting to the camera! My understanding had been that bats reacted to the clicking sound made by a camera rather than the light, so this is new territory! The annual bat count on the 20<sup>th</sup> January found 441 bats, 304 being Greater Horseshoes.

Chris Pickles is working on a new website which will hold a collection of archive material about the village, drawing on Beer Village Heritage resources as well as the content of the Beer Memories website. The new site will work alongside the BVH website which will continue to keep you up-to-date with current activities. The Mariners' Hall management committee has agreed to "own" the new website.

Last month we pointed out some spectacular sights in the night sky. Such a pity that the weather was really unhelpful, and clouds made it very difficult to so see the Jupiter-Saturn conjunction at its best. I didn't see many shooting stars either. Earlier this month some of you may have witnessed the Jupiter-

Saturn-Mercury configuration.

We may be having some cold weather at the moment, but there are signs of Spring in the garden. The snowdrops are making a brave show, and the primroses are continuing to give us some colour. The frost has finally killed off the nasturtiums, which were still flowering into early January! The birds are grateful for the offerings on the bird table, and do make sure that there is water available for them to drink, and to bathe in.

#### **Beer Men's Shed**

#### Keeping busy In a COVID world...

When you get into a lockdown situation like the current COVID one, you've got a choice. You can slow down and stop doing anything, or you can get busy and start doing something new! Usually, we're all too busy doing day-to-day stuff to even think of



starting something new: it's hard enough keeping up with the old stuff! But a lot of *us* have been picking up new skills during the lockdowns, almost without trying. For example, most of us hadn't used Zoom before COVID came, and most of *us* have learned something more about the technology that we've got because we had to if we want to join in things.

Beer Men's Shed isn't just about doing woodwork. Most of our members have each got around 45 years of work-experience behind them. Multiply that by around 30 members and you've got over 1,300 man-years of knowledge, capability, brainpower, dynamism and initiative on tap. Each of the members has taken a different approach to lockdown - learning a foreign language, building a website, raising donations for our new workshop, and so on. We've been taking projects home instead of being in our workshop together - fixing computer software, sorting out people's broadband and wifi problems, mending vacuum cleaners and so on.

...to keep us informed, and to provide all the help...

We've also started to get ready for Spring on our allotment that was given to us last year by Clinton Devon Estates. Onions and turnips were planted in December to overwinter, and a new delivery of seed potatoes, onion sets and carrot seeds have just arrived ready to be planted before the end of February. That will be part of the outdoor exercise that we're all allowed.

Beer Men's Shed is not, unfortunately, like 'The Repair Shop" on television. We aren't master craftsmen that can make magic happen to any old broken heirloom. The Shed is there as a Male Mental Health initiative - to help men who might be feeling lonely or isolated, or even excluded. When we're working in the Shed and look around, I'm sure that each of us thinks that none of that applies to me: we think that we're OK and we're just there to do jobs and to help other fellers who need the company. "I don't need to be here, but some of the other chaps do", we think. 'Typical men!", you might say.



But we're **a** "support group" - we're there to help each other and any other men who want to join in from any of the surrounding towns or villages.

Luckily for us, the Government has made a special rule for "support groups" during the COVID pandemic. We're allowed to keep our doors open as long as no more than 15 people are inside the workshop (our own rules are that we

don't allow more than 6 during COVID) and as long as we're all wearing masks. The Government guidelines also say that people are allowed to leave home to attend support groups, so the members are OK to come along to the workshop. The vast majority of them have decided to self-isolate - but we still open up for our formal workshop sessions each week in case anybody needs us.

With all that energy from Beer Men's Shed being baffled up indoors, it's got to burst out somewhere! You may have seen in the media that we've just been given £10,000 by the National Lottery, £6,500 by EDDC, £2,000 by Devon County Council. We broke through our first goal of raising £20,000 in only eight weeks. But then another COVID lockdown started, so, we started raising more money.



The next bit of good news is that the Exeter Chiefs' Foundation has just agreed to donate £4,000 to Beer Men's Shed to help towards building our new and larger second workshop.

We're getting ready for the end of this COVID lockdown and planning

ahead for our new workshop, so that we can welcome more men from our area to join in the Shed's work. We're being positive and looking forward to a better tomorrow. How does that song go? - "Ain't no stopping us now...!"

#### **Surviving the Winter Lockdown**

I don't know about you, but it felt to me as if the whole world was being told that we'd wake up on 1st January 2021 and the sky would be blue, the birds would be singing and everything that was wrong with 2020 would have simply gone away? Is it any wonder then, that people are feeling ever more anxious and panicked by the current lockdown?

First of all, we need to be reassured that we will get through it. It might be taking a little longer than we had all hoped, but if we think how far we've come already, we can get through this. We just need to keep being kind to ourselves and those around us. The really important thing is to focus on the now.
